Franklin Park Conservatory and Botanical Gardens Opens New Fall Exhibition

Columbus, OH—Franklin Park Conservatory and Botanical Gardens' take on the Halloween season opens October 3, 2015, with a new horticulture exhibition and accompanying display of pumpkin sculptures by Villafane Studios.

SCARY PLANTS

October 3-November 15, 2015.

Imaginative, immersive horticulture displays designed by Conservatory staff transform the Dorothy M. Davis Showhouse with Halloween-inspired themes, such as an abandoned greenhouse, an old cemetery, and enchanted forest. Unusual plants featured in the exhibition include carnivorous species like the Venus fly trap, and the Sensitive Plant, which recoils when touched.

IN THE GALLERY

One-of-a-kind pumpkin carvings of humorous, weird and wild characters, created by artists from the internationally exhibited Villafane Studios, are on display in the Cardinal Health Gallery.

The 12 pumpkin carvings are placed in brine-filled tanks to preserve them for display through November 15. Four vignettes of non-carved pumpkin characters accompany the carvings.

Conservatory visitors can watch the exhibit come to life as Ray Villafane and artists from Villafane Studios create their artwork on site, October 3 & 4, 10am–5pm, free with admission.

Ray Villafane, an Arizona-based artist, specializes in highly intricate, 3-D style pumpkin sculptures.
