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GROWING TO GREEN WINNERS ANNOUNCED DURING CELEBRATION OF OHIO'S HARVEST

Columbus, OH—On Thursday, September 13, Franklin Park Conservatory hosted the annual Growing to Green Awards and Harvest Banquet at The Wells Barn. Over 200 local community gardeners, business owners and civic leaders joined to celebrate community gardening and city beautification projects in central Ohio and beyond.

The program opened with a lively performance by Momentum, a nonprofit dance organization serving central Ohio youth in arts education and outreach. The choreographed routine showcased early-1900s dance styles, celebrating the 100th Anniversary of the Harlem Renaissance.

Prior to Thursday evening, Franklin Park Conservatory and Botanical Gardens' Women's Board and community garden leaders reviewed entries for the seven Growing to Green Award categories and selected the following winners:

Neighborhood Improvement Project of the Year

\$250 awarded to the park, gateway, streetscape or beautification project that does the most to benefit its surrounding community. Presented by Jenny Pope, Director of Community Outreach and Education at Franklin Park Conservatory and Botanical Gardens.

Winner: The Milo Grogan Green Space

Education Garden of the Year

\$500 awarded to a garden that best utilizes garden projects for educational purposes. Presented by Barbara Brandt, member of the Conservatory's Board of Trustees and chair of the Community Outreach and Education Committee.

Winner: Urban GEMS at Millennium Community School

Paul B. Redman Youth Leadership Award

\$250 awarded to an outstanding youth gardener, to be applied toward his/her education or garden. Presented by Ann Joyce, 2018 Franklin Park Conservatory Women's Board President.

Winner: Ty'Keice Cox



Sustainability Award

\$250 awarded to a garden best utilizing sustainable gardening practices, including community-building activities, sustainable garden design and utilization of green practices. Presented by Dan Sharpe, Vice President - Community Research and Grants Management, Columbus Foundation.

Winner: The Children's Gardens of the Early Childhood Education Partnership

Community Gardener of the Year

\$250 awarded to a person who is exceptionally dedicated to his/her community garden and the gardening movement. Presented by Bill Gerhardt, GreenScapes Landscape Company. Bill is also a member of Franklin Park Conservatory's Board of Trustees.

Community Garden of the Year

\$500 awarded to the top neighborhood gardening project for food production or beautification. Presented by Su Lok, The Scotts Miracle-Gro Company. Su is also a member of Franklin Park Conservatory's Board of Trustees.

Winner: The Friends Garden

Boyd W. Bowden Garden Impact Award

\$750 awarded to the top neighborhood gardening project for significant and sustainable impact on the health and vitality of its community. Presented by Ellen Bowden, on behalf of the Boyd Bowden Family and the Osteopathic Heritage Foundation.

Winner: Moler Learning Farm
