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HARVEST BLOOMS MAKES FOR A FABULOUS FALL AT THE CONSERVATORY

Columbus, OH — Fall is full of beauty, and nothing captures the spirit of the season quite like *Harvest Blooms* at Franklin Park Conservatory and Botanical Gardens. This horticultural exhibition is on display daily from September 24 through October 30, 2022.

Harvest Blooms sees the botanical gardens and container gardens filled with rich horticultural displays composed of thousands of pumpkins, gourds, mums and cabbages. In addition to these displays, visitors will discover that both pumpkin houses have returned and are joined by two new displays: a larger-than-life cornucopia and a magnificent pumpkin tree. Primarily located in the outdoor gardens, elements of *Harvest Blooms* are visible in the Grand Atrium, Dorothy M. Davis Showhouse and The Grove rooftop garden.

One of the most beloved parts of fall in Central Ohio is the colorful foliage. Color changes happen throughout the season, and "peak foliage" usually arrives mid- to late-October, depending on weather and temperature. Visitors looking for fall leaves to accent their *Harvest Blooms* experience should follow along with the Conservatory's <u>Fall Color Report</u> online and on social media.

While at the Conservatory for *Harvest Blooms*, visitors can see the indoor plant <u>collections</u>, the <u>Chihuly Collection</u>, <u>Paul Busse Garden Railway</u> and <u>Diálogos</u>. Harvest Blooms is also on view during <u>Pumpkins Aglow</u>, a Special Engagement on select evenings in October.
